FOUNDER

St. Augustine of Hippo, born in the year 354, spent many years of his life engrossed in vice. Through the devoted prayers of his mother, St. Monica, and the preaching of St. Ambrose, he finally broke free of his sinful living and was baptized. He had always been incredibly intelligent, so it was not long before he became a priest, a bishop, and a famous Catholic writer. However, the Augustinian Order was formed in the year 1243, when Pope Innocent IV officially called all Tuscan hermits to unite together under the Rule of Saint Augustine. These Hermits had already desired to pursue the specific path of Augustinian spirituality, and they were finally confirmed by the Church.

TYPE

The Augustinians are a Mendicant Religious Order. Mendicants are friars or sisters that live from alms, recite the Divine Office, and evangelize through apostolic activities.

HABIT
